This idea came originally as a suggestion from Haydon Peterson, editor of News Nuggets - the publication of the Central Iowa Mineral Society. It was developed by Gus Brown, chairman, Membership-Publicity Committee of your Federation with the help and encouragement of many others.

More about that as time elapses.

Many other important matters too numerous to mention were effectively handled by the Board at this two-day meeting.

Important: Reservation blanks will be in the hands of your Liaison Representative by the end of February.

TO ALL BULLETIN EDITORS AND LIAISON OFFICERS:

We thank you for the publicity that you are giving the Midwest and the Ishpeming Rock & Mineral Club with regards to our 1960 Fieldtrip Convention. From now until the Convention, July 1, 2, 3, and 4, 1960, more publicity will be written about our efforts to provide you with 4 days of fieldtrips.

As the Editor of "The Glacial Drifter" of Grand Rapids said, "Where else could you collect with "a pass and a guide?" He is so right--as you will sign your "release" and be placed in a certain field trip group when you "check in" for the convention. The field trip chairman in charge of your group will have your passes for the next four days.

It will not be possible for you to take in all of the collecting areas that we have up here, but we will see that you will be kept busy visiting the best.

We expect to have at least 20 separate field trips going on at the same time with separate trips being run off in the Iron River and Copper Country and Ironwood areas for those that sign up for them. Details will be published in EARTH SCIENCE MAGAZINE.

We expect (from the estimates given us) to have in excess of 700 Rockhounds here for the four days of collecting. It will be important that all persons planning on attending should place their reservations with us by the first of Juno. Work will then begin for us. Each of you will be personally placed in certain fieldtrip groups during the month of Juno. Important registration blanks will be in the hands of all Liaison Officers by the end of the month of February.

We are encouraging families to take their children along. Registration for Juniors will be half price as well as a separate Junior banquet at half-price which will take place at the same time and in the same building as the Midwest's Annual Banquet on Sunday, July 3, 1960. The Juniors will have their own program geared to their liking.

All local trips will be by your own transportation. If reasonable rates can be obtained for chartered buses, trips to the Iron River and Copper Country and Ironwood areas will be by bus, otherwise we shall try to arrange for you to proceed (not caravaning) to these areas for their fieldtrips.

When working Turquoise, take care never to overheat it.



THIS OLD FOSSIL REALLY OLDSTER
Los Angeles....A rare fossil sea lion, some 20 million years old, can now be seen with almost all its bones neatly in place. In an exhibit prepared by William P. Otto of Los Angeles County Museum, the fossil bones are in a large block of matrix. This extinct sea lion, named *Atopotaritus coursoni*, is related to the living California sea lion common along the Pacific coast from Mexico to Northern California. It was found at a point 500 feet up on the northeast side of the Palos Verdes Hills imbedded in rocks of the early Miocene period. The sea lion was named in honor of Walter H. Courson Jr., on whose property the fossil remains were found.
