

PROFILE OF A ROCKHOUND ---

Few think of the wonderful and capable people involved and the firm and lasting friendships that we make. If we could evaluate the rewards of being a "Rockhound", the collections that we make would surely be second to the people we meet. Many of these men and women contribute, not only to our hobby, but the community as well.

The Ishpeming Rock and Mineral Club is fortunate to have many such members. Recently this was emphasized by the appointment of one of the founding fathers of our club, Mr. C.R. "Bob" Markert to the important job of Executive Vice President of the Greater Ishpeming Chamber of Commerce. A few days later Bob was named to the board of directors and Vice President of international operations of the Hematite Development Corp. All this after retiring from a career with the U.S. Post Office. He is beginning a new career at a time when most of us would be content to set back and rest on our laurels.

IN HELVILONIER

To list Bob's accomplishments and activities would take pages, but briefly-- After graduation from Ishpeming High School, he was employed by Cleveland-Cliffs Iron Company, served in the Navy Construction Battalion during World War II for three years, and worked for the U.S. Postal Service for 28 years. For many years he has been interested in earth science and served as president of the Midwest Federation of Mineralogical and Geological Societies, and as a director of the American Federation of Mineralogical Societies. Bob has served in all of the offices of the Ishpeming Rock and Mineral Club and has written many articles for mineral and earth science magazines. He has been active in scouting, the Marquette County Historical Society and is a member of the Ishpeming American Legion Post.

It is rather interesting that while preparing this article our attention was called to a story in "The Prospector", the bulletin of the Muskegon County Rock and Mineral Association from which we would like to quote.

"Making new Friends is Big Part of Rocking" by Paul W. Schulze.

"An early discovery by an ardent mineral collector is that the friendships he makes as he follows his hobby in near and remote places are frequently as beautiful as the specimens he uncovers.

Take Ishpeming's Bob Markert, for instance.

Newcomers to any hobby or profession usually make pilgrimages to learn from the acknowledged authorities in the field. We were no exception and the amazing discovery for us was that the experts in our hobby are more than eager to share the knowledge they have acquired during their many years of study and search.



INDEX OF NEW AND DISCREDITED MINERAL NAMES

By Margaret Yanasek Nomenclature Chairman

The Mineralogical Society of America has published papers on minerals in its journal, The American Mineralogist, since 1916. Included in their publications have been articles on new minerals, new names, invalid names and new data.

In 1966 the Society published An Index of New Mineral Names, Discredited Minerals, and Changes of Mineralogical Nomenclature. This Index, Vol. 51 of the American Mineralogist, covers publications of nomenclature changes from 1916 through 1965. The listing is divided into three tables. Table I is an alphabetical indes of new mineral names, discredited minerals, and changes in names, Table II lists the minerals by anionic groups, and Table III lists the minerals by the elements present. These lists are in alphabetical order, are well cross-indexed, and give the valid and invalid names as well as synonyms.

As a back reference, the Volume and page numbers of the American Mineralogist where the mineral is mentioned are also given. This is of value only to those having access to the past issues of the publications. However, for the person interested in the proper naming of minerals, this index is valuable by itself. No back issues are needed. As an added value the chemical formulla of all valid minerals are given.

Although the American Mineralogist is available only to subscribing members of the Journal of the Mineralogical Society of America, this single issue has been made available to the general public. It may be secured, postpaid, at \$3.20 per copy by ordering from Marjorie Hooker, Treasurer, Mineralogical Society of America, U.S. Geológical Survey, Washington, D.C. 20525. Ask for The American Mineralogist, Vol. 51, No. 8 (August 1956).

PURLOIN THAT PEBBLE?

Don't do it if it's any part of the ancient ruins protected by the Antiquities Act.

Just one rock from old Fort Fiute's silent walls, you say, would certainly make an interesting conversation piece for your den.

Well, don't do it. Uncle Sam has a law for the "preservation of American antiquities," and it applies specifically to any "historic or prehistoric ruin or monument, or any object of antiquity situated on lands owned or controlled by the Government of the United States."

The public land of the West abounds in interesting examples of early man's art, manufacturing processes and everyday living habits. Some prime examples are found here in southern California, but there are others all over the West. Uncle Sam wants to preserve and protect these antiquities for the pleasure of all the people. Of course, he wants you to enjoy these things, too, but not in your den.

Yours To Enjoy

Roam the Yuha Desert near Coyote Wells and you may find intaglios fashioned in the desert floor by Indians long ago. Here the earth is hard-packed at the surface and imbedded with pebbles and small rocks. Indians made designs in this so called "desert pavement" by removing the rocks and pebbles covered with a dark "desert varnish" and exposing the lighter material underneath. The size and shape of these designs, which are not confined to this area, are limited only by the imagination of these artists of long ago.

Explore the hills and mountains of northern and eastern San Bernardino County and you are almost certain to discover at least one set of petroglyphs, designs chipped into the rocks by people long forgotten.

Near Barstow, at Coyote Dry Lake, stone chippings and other artifacts give evidence of habitation by prehistoric man. Near Midland, ruins of dwellings and broken pottery remain to tell of those who once lived there. Further to the north, the tumbled rock walls of Fort Piute mark the Old Immigrant Trail and remind us of the struggles and hardships of the early pioneers.

Unguarded but Protected

These sites lie unguarded on public land. Many others probably still are undiscovered. Perhaps, if you like to explore the mountains and deserts, you might find evidence of a now dead civilization—evidence not before glimpsed by modern man. And wouldn't that old jar look wonderful on the mantel over the fireplace in the family room? And that tiny portion of the cliff containing the petroglyphs—what a gem for the rock garden out by the pool? Again we say, "don't do it!"

As we said, these sites lie unguarded on public domain lands. But they are not unprotected. The Congress, on June 8, 1906, recognizing the need to protect these priceless relics, enacted the Antiquities Law. Any person who appropriates, excavates, injures, or destroys any of these objects without proper permission is subject to a fine of not more than \$500, or imprisonment for not more than 90 days, or both.

And "proper permission" referred to in the Antiquities Act is not easy to obtain. Permission for the examination of ruins, the excavation of archaeological sites, and the "gathering of articles of antiquity" may be grahted by the secretary of the department of the Government having jurisdiction over the area (Secretary of Agriculture for National Forest Lands, Secretary of the Interior for Public Lands, etc.). But permits are granted only for the benefit of reputable museums, universities, colleges, or other recognized scientific or educational institutions, with a view to increasing the knowledge of such objects. The act further provides that any gatherings of objects shall be preserved in a public museum.

Regulations provide that in addition to arrest, fine and/or imprisonment, the articles taken without a permit may be seized wherever found and at any time. Incidentally, all persons employed by the Forest Service and Park Service are authorized to make arrests for violations of this law.

Does all this mean you cannot enjoy this heritage from the past? Certainly not. Many of the sites have been designated as Historical Landmarks or National Monuments. Others are marked on maps, cr set aside by designation by the agency concerned. These are yours to examine and wonder at, to see and admire, but they must be left as they are found, to be enjoyed by those who will come later.

So, who knows, you may some day wander upon your own private, undiscovered, prehistoric site. If you do, look at it, enjoy it, photograph it, and report it, to the nearest Government office of the agency responsible for the land.

But leave it undisturbed.





OUR WINTER VACATION

near Kissimmee, Florida. There we visited a most unique monument. It is made up of over fifteen hundred different kinds of stones from every state of the U.S.A. and twenty one foreign countries. It took two years for construction, and what a beautiful display of outstanding rocks, minerals, and fossils. We recognized many, such as petrified wood, granite, egate, quartz, sandstone, gold-bearing stone, copper, coral, micaceous hematite, and petrified bone. There were many more specimens displayed over the monument. We spent an hour, never losing interest in this unusual exhibit of e geologist's dream. The monument was dedicated on March 28 1943. The civic and community organizations pooled their efforts, abilities and finances to make this a thing of beauty. It is called the "Monument of the States", and is located in Lake Front Park, Kissimmee, Florida.

Then on north; starting to rain now, getting cold and chilly. We stopped in Kentucky in the caves area for a break. Found a piece of onyx, and a few pieces of beautiful quartz crystal from a stand near a private cave. Really cold and miserable now; so on into Indiana for our nite stop-over. It had snowed during the night, so we were feeling like we were nearing home. On with the overshoes and a heavier jacket arriving in Lansing about nine P.M. in the middle of a blizzard and cold, cold winter. We were happy to pull into my daughter's yard and get inside for warmth and hot coffee.

Arne had his doctor's check-up a couple of days later, was given the OK for work, so on our way to Ishpeming on the 24th of February. We had a wonderful trip. Saw a couple of bad accidents, and were so thankful that in our four thousand miles we never even had a scratch.

BELOIT COLLEGE FOSSILS

Lately we read in the Milwaukee Journal of a \$160,000 Petrified Present which was given to Beloit College in Wisconsin by Mr. Robert H. Solem, a business man and well informed amateur fossil collector. He had bought the collection of fossils from Mr. Burnice H. Beane, a farmer, who as a boy became fascinated with the fossils found in a limestone quarry in Le Grand, Iowa. Throughout his life Beane had gathered the fossils until he had accumulated them in his farmyard, chicken coop, barn, drawers, and the newspaper said, even under his bed. It was no trouble for him to haul a 500 pound chunk and spend hours chipping away with small tools to expose the delicate fossils. A great many students came from far away to study the early forms of life which date back to the time when the Gulf of Mexico covered the center of the United States with water, in some places to a depth of 600 feet.

A lot of work remains to be done on this large collection. The display will be ready for exhibition in about two years. This would be educational as well as entertaining for rockhounds to see when they happen to be in the southern Wisconsin area.

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
