

SCHOLARSHIP REPORT - NOVEMBER 1, 1980




The enthusiastic requests for dealer and display spaces promises this to be a really fantastic show.

Your officers and committee chairmen have appreciated having most of you be so helpful in the routine club business, club activities and special projects. Thank you for caring, sharing and doing.


NOTES FROM THE SECRETARY'S MINUTES

Our early field trip on May 17 will be to some of the old iron mine dumps just west of Michigamme, now known as the Ohio Mine group. These mines are no longer active but will no doubt be reactivated at some future date when the bast quantities of lowgrade ore is needed.

Memorial Day weekend*to the copper country with a stay at Lake Fanny Hooe Resort and Campgrounds promises to be a fun trip. Hope we find some Lake Superior agates, datolite, thomsonite, and, of course, copper and silver.

June 20, a Saturday, we will again visit the Republic Mine, thanks to the Cleveland Cliffs Iron Company. In the past we have found various forms of quartz, calcite, pyrite, and hematite crystals along with some banded cutting material of jaspilite and specular hematite.

It has been a long day of rockhounding and your pack is heavy with the day's find. A drink from the cold, clear stream tumbling over rocks nearby would taste so good! But STOP! Is that water safe?

I recently developed continual diarrhea, vomiting, noxious gas and belching. Severely dehydrated and unable to keep any food down for 10 days, I was hospitalized with what my doctor thought was Viral Gastroenteritis. After several days of testing, however, it became evident that I was a victim of Giardia Lamblia, from one such crystal clear stream.

Giardia Lamblia is the term used for a parasite hosted in the intestinal tracts of many animals. Those animals such as muskrat, beaver, moose, etc., pass through streams and excrete waste into them. Along with the waste pass the Giardia Lamblia cysts which are capable of surviving in cold water for up to two months. Giardia Lamblia can be transmitted by contact from infected persons and food and drink, but in the United States, where sanitary standards are usually high, the general method of transmission is from cold water. New York, New Hampshire, Colorado, Utah, Vermont, Oregon and Washington State have had water borne outbreaks. Most recently, the October Festival in Leavenworth, WA., was disrupted by such an outbreak.

Giardia Lamblia does not cause symptoms in all persons who contract it -- just why not is still being investigated -- and those who do not know that they have it may become carriers capable of infecting others. One medication used to eradicate this parasite is Flagyl which is available by prescription only.

Because I became so ill from this parasite, almost losing the child I was carrying, I researched it and felt that other rockhounds should be advised of the possible danger of drinking from water sources in recreational areas.

The only way to destroy Giardia Lamblia is to boil all water taken from streams or rural reservoirs including water used for washing and food preparation as this instantly destroys the parasite. Chlorine tablets and water treatment kits will not do the trick.

Giardia Lamblia is not the harmless infection it was considered to be for many years. It is capable of causing severe symptoms which may require hospitalization. Since it is also considered to be the most common pathogenic intestinal parasite in the United States, use caution when drinking water in recreational areas!

It's time to study maps, check the batteries in detectors and hunt up the hammers and the other collecting gear. The first sign of bare ground in the spring triggers, in a rockhound, an urgent desire to get out to his favorite collecting sites. Some folks are lured to the fishing stream, picnic grounds or bicycle paths at springtime. We rockhounds head for the dirty, rough, rugged, remote mine rock piles where we work harder than we have all winter.

Some of our club members may have to take it a bit slowly this spring.

Bob M., we hope you have recovered from your heart surgery so you will be well enough to revisit

your favorite collecting sites and to share your wisdom with the less knowledgable in our group.

Bob S., in spite of the jolt you took, we know you'll be busy at your handcrafts as long as your mind is "creating" and you're able to move.

Dorothy T., we're all happy that you are able to think and plan in terms of rock piles and beaches. Frazier is a good nurse.

Pete, we understand that you are spending more time in the hospital. We hope those Green Bay doctors know how to mend an old conductor. We're anxious for you to come home.

Ray, we're glad you have been able to get to most of our meetings. We need you to watch the purse strings.
