GEORGE R. "BUD" BAMFORD Dec. 2, 1904- May 28, 1984

Bud, as we all knew him, was the son of George Oliver Banford of Ishpeming. Bud grew up and was educated in Ishpeming. He became a miner early in life going to work in the Section 16 mine of the Oliver Mining Co. where he continued in mining for about 15 years and this was his first contact with the beautiful botryoidal Goethites whick abounded undergroung at the Sec. 16. Bud often expressed regrets that he was more active in collecting those prize specimens.

Bud married Lena Nault in April 1930 and they had two lovely daughters. Bud was also survived by grand-childred and great grandchildred, who were the apple of Bud's eye. Bud worked as a fireman for the City

of Ishpeming until his retirement a number of years ago.

Bud was one of the organizers and charter member of the Ishpeming Rock & Mineral Club. He was the first Vice-Pres. of the newly chartered club and then took over the job of Treasurer- a position he held for some 12 years.

Buds' excellent collection featured some of the rarer forms of Iron Minerals, however a good general collection existed which attested to the many friends he had in the Rock Hobby and contains some specimens from many far away places. Bud was an amature Lapidarist and taught some of us the art many years ago.

Buds real interest was in finding and sharing excellent Mineral specimens and Crystals that exist on

the pristine piles of years ago.

All of us who knew him and collected with him miss him and will always rember him.
