## KIMBERLITES OF THE U. P.

There has been considerable exploration interest in the area of Iron County, Michigan. A body of Kimberlite has been "discovered" within the past ten years in the vicinity of Lake Ellen and the Michigamme Reservoir.

Kimberlite is a volcanic rock which can be a host rock for diamonds. Kimberlite "pipes" are a oddity to the U.P. in that they are geologically quite young-post Ordivician in age- and are not metamorphosed like the surrounding rock. This pipe is the only documented find to date. Exploration companies are actively looking for more of these pipes, but their research is made difficult be tens and hundreds of feet of glacial overburden. (At the same time, this also makes for difficult panning in stream beds by rockhound hobbyists !) "PIPE"

According to most authors, Kimberlite pipes have a classic shape. The diagram shows the conical shape of the pipe. Some Kimberlites in southern Africa are mined as deep as 2500°. Diamondiferous Kimberlite contains both gem-quality and industrial diamonds. Proportions of these can vary from pipe to pipe. Why these pipes come to the surface of the earth is not fully understood. Kimberlite pipes are estimated to be emplaced very rapidly and violently. (approximately 70 m.p.h.)

Kimberlite is a rather unimpressive rock in hand specimen. Samples from the Lake Ellen 1000'-Kimberlite are grey-green with a few blocky white limestone fragments. Most of the rock is composed of olivine, garnet and black magnesium ilmenite. Microscopic mineral grains were on display courtesy of Olive Sain and Ingrid Bartelli. The garnet grains are especially beautiful under a microscope. They vary in color from purple, blood red, orange to pink. These garnets are quite different than, for example, garnets from Lake Michigamme area. Kimberlite garnets have virtually no crystal facies and are quite fractured.

For furthur information, the U.S.C.S. publishes Circular 842, "The potential for diamond bearing Kimberlite in Northern Michigan and Wisconsin" by Cannon and Mudrey. I understand this information is free for the asking.

# KNOW YOUR CLEANERS

eculian accident reported by the National Safety Council involved two household engineers (Housewives) seperate cases. Both were using an ordinary toilet bowl cleaner. Not satisfied with the way it was working to remove the stain, each one added some household bleach and stirred with a brush. One died quickly- the other spent a long time in the hospital.

A U.S. Navy medical newsletter tells about 20 people being overcome by gas or gasses released from a cleaning mixture. Investigation revealed the mixture included a wellknown liquid household cleaner, chlorine bleach and ammonia.

What happened in the above cases was that a poisonous gas was liberated when the users decided to use a mixture of two or more common household cleaning agents. When the widely used chlorine bleach ( a sodium hypochlorite solution) is combined with an acid or acid-producing substance, such as toilet bowl cleaner or vinegar, there is a sudden release of a quantity of chlorine gas. Likewise, when the chlorine bleach is mixed with ammonia, lye or other alkaline substances, the action will produce a highly irritating gas. If the gas is inhaled, in each case, it can cause serious injury and possible death. Accidents of this type have occurred not only in the kitchen and bathroom, but also in the cleaning and treating of the water in swimming pools. Don't make the mistake of thinking that because household products are good and useful that the combination of two or more of them will do a better job. Follow the rules- use chemical cleaners as the manufacturers direct on the label, and keep in mind some scouring powders now contain chlorine bleach. It is best, any-ay, not to use a hypochlorate (chlorine) bleach in toliet bowls, sinks and bathtubs, or on electrical appliances, as it can injure, dull or roughen a fine smooth porclain surface. DO NOT MIX CHLORINE BLEACH- with toilet bowl cleaners.

### THE AFMS SCHOLARSHIP FOUNDATION By: Olive Sain

The American Federation of Mineralogical Societies (AFMS) established the Scholarship foundation and incorporated it in Minnesota in 1964. A tax exemption was obtained from the IRS the same year. The members of the foundation, equivalent of stockholders in a commercial corporation, are the eighteen directors and officers of the AFMS. The president of the federation is always the vice-president of the foundation. The Board of Directors elects a president, treasurer and secretary, each for two terms, ggered, to insure continuity of experienced management. Thus the foundation, while an independent rporation, is entirely under the control of the Federation.

The object of the foundation is to accumulate a fund, the income only to be used to finance scholarships. The principal amount cannot be used, this insures the usefulness of the fund in perpetuity.

The grants are divided among the six federations according to the earnings generated by the contributions received from each federation. Grants are restricted to graduate students to avoid wasting money on students who are not committed to earth science subjects, as it is felt that any student working toward a Master's degree is presumed to have definitely decided to follow the field for their lifetime vocation. The students are selected by a rather complicated system: each year each of the six fedxrations selects two persons of prominence in the earth science field. From among these persons the foundation's Jury of Awards selects one from each federation and each of these honorary award winners in turn selects the school and student who is to receive the grant. This method, while indirect, benefits needy students and avoids the enormous task and expense of receiving, sifting and evaluating applications from hundreds of students.
