A trip to Minnesota for agates started off the season. Yes, these were lake Superior agates but mature Loes as nature wants. The glaciers pushed the Lake Superior agates into Minnesota so even though we live in the shore of the Big Lake, agates are scarce locally.

We are more fortunate when it comes to collecting copper specimens, green stones, datolite & thomsonite. The greatest deposit of native copper in the world lies at our doorstep and it also contains native silver.

A good halfbreed is a prized specimen. Our summer is never complete without at least one trek around Copper Country.

And then there are the iron mines, even closer to home. They yield a wide variety of associated mineral specimens and some beautiful lapidary materials, crystals and the like.

Our summer is never complete without several trips to the Kona Dolomite quarry. Found nowhere else in the world, it is highly prized for lapidary purposes. KNOW YOUR MINERALS: Hydrous calcium potassium fluorsilicate, often with a small amount of iron and nickel.

Colorless, white, gray, greenish, yellowish, reddish; vitreous, pearly on cleavage; streak white. Hardness 4

5. Cleavage, perfect, one direction. Crystals; Tetragonal; usually cubelike or tabular, square in cross section; also lamellar, granular, compact. Commonly found in cavities in basalt of volcanic rock, where it is associated with zeolites and prehnite. Large glassy crystals have come from the copper country mine on the Keweenaw Peninsula.

We spent two days collecting Kona and specimens from local piles as well as material found along Deer Lake road from the Ropes Gold mine, A new find of charcoal slag was found in what used to be Deer Lake in Ishpeming. Within the last year the lake was drained to clean up a mercury contamination. At the turn of the century a charcoal furnace was operating at a point where the Carp flows into Deer Lake and the slag was dumped into the lake. Some very desirable specimens were picked up- all colors and sizes. As long as the lake is down it will be a good collecting spot, easy to get to and only about one hundred yards off the road.

Again the annual Swap & Sell was a success- Rock hounds from nine states and Canada were present. At the Crackerbarrell session we had a good number of VIP's present. Bill Parch, lst VP of the Mid-West Fed., also Florence Hill, State Director and several assistant directors. SCRATCHES WHILE POLISHING: Stones sometimes develop fine, threadlike scratches whilebeing polished. This may be due to grit that has penetrated the polishing buff (one grain will do it). To clean the buff, hold a strip of soft plywood or balsa wood firmly against the buff. The grit will embed itself in the wood, leaving the buff clean.

HINT: When you have finished using the grinding wheel for lapidary work, ALWAYS turn the water off before turning off the motor. The reason: the water dripping on a stationary wheel will enter the steme. It may cause a fracture. It may even break off the next time you put it to use. Therefore, NEVER, NEVER stand in ont of the grinding wheels when you turn on the motor.
