MARCH 16 PROGRAM and ACTIVITY

Pat Bemis presented a slide program on the Mt. St. Helens eruption. In addition he had enlarged photos of the mountain before and after the eruption. Copies of major newspapers gave pictorial and descriptive news of that fateful event that did such a tremendous amount of damage to Gifford Pinchot National Forest, business and homes.

The total value of resources and facilities lost on forest land alone was estimated

at \$134,087,000. Samples of the gray ash were on display.

Following the program there was a demonstration and practice by everyone on making small 2-piece boxes for jewelry or small items out of old greeting cards or similar weight light oak tag stock. Everyone found the boxes easy to make and could see many uses for them.

Ernie Johnson brought the "know how" from a demonstration at the MWF Show in Minnesota a few years ago. Olive Sain was the substitute instructor but Ernie says he will give a

demonstration during the summer Swap.

FEBRUARY 16 PROGRAM

"Campsite of Ancient Miners found in the Teal Lake Area" discovered by Jim Paquette was presented by Jim aided by slides of the dig and artifacts found, actual artifacts and his personal experience in the archaeological excavation project he initiated in 1984 and completed in 1985.

Dr: Marla Buckmaster, archaeologist from NMU supervised the dig with John Richards of the U of W-Milwaukee as assistant. In addition Jim and a number of students from NMU and Wisconsin worked at the site for six weeks. Paquette said that the material taken in the dig might go as far back as the Late Paleo-Indian group which inhabited this region 8,000

years ago.

Among the artifacts found were tools chipped from quartz and quartzite, including a variety of blades, scrapers, choppers, perforators and projectile points. Copper was also found in various stages of manufacture and was apparently from the Keweenaw Peninsula or Isle Royale and belonged to groups of Archaid Indians associated with the "Old Copper Culture" and known to have mined copper in the Keweenaw and Ontonagon areas some 2-5,000 years ago.

The site was found to be somewhat confusing by those working on the dig. Paquette said, because many different types of items were intermixed. The reason for this was probably because there was very little soil development in the region. "There was perhaps six inches of soil development on top of the glacial development", he said. "Some 10,000 years of items mixed into six inches, can make it very confusing."

Some parallels are believed to exist between the Negaunee site and one in Thunder Bay,

Ontario called the Cummins site thought to be 8,000 years old. Paquette said what may have attracted the Indians to the Teal Lake area for short-term encampment may have been the large outcroppings bordering that side of the lake. Evidence of quarrying/chipping work on quartz/quartzite outcroppings were also shown in Jim's slides.

when the IRMC micromounters began the study of the flat of material from the White Pine Mine, we figured we'd be finished with a full report of all the minerals in 2 or 3 months -all mounted, too. We are discovering so many minerals; some we can identify, others not.

We sorted the rocks into bags of Calcite, Barite, Chalcocite, Chalcopyrite, pyrite, Bornite, Silver, Copper, unknown blues or browns, etc. We have worked on each bag of the minerals to sort out those for mounting and photographing. Olive has done a superb job of

trinming and mounting the specimens to be included in our club collection.

If we complete the mounting of specimens of each of the known and unknown minerals in our possession from White Pine, that will be it for this year since we'll not meet to work on them after May. The describing, catologing and phtographing will have to wait for another year. But some day the six diligen workers (Karen and Dean Rossell, Carl Gutman, Bill Rogers, Clive Sain and Ingrid Bartelli) will have a valuable contribution for the IRMC.

HAND POLISHING PETOSKEY STONES ... Florence Hill from F. Pickerd

Materials needed: Petoskey stones, 3" or less in diameter. If they are beach polished or lightly tumbled, use only sand and gravel as grit; the work will go faster. Silicon carbide sandpaper (wet or dry) #180,220,400, and #600. Pieces of inner tube or thick newspapers; pieces of cotton velvet, water, and polishing powder (Ultragloss or ...)

Method: Use a thick pad of tire rubber/ newspapers under each piece of sandpaper or cotton velvet. The pad should be a little larger than the sandpaper or velvet. Use sandpaper full or half-sheet size, and work the stone around all parts of the paper for economical use of the paper.

Hold the dampened stone firmly in the hand, and rub the area of the stone to be polished

on the sandpaper with a stea y, light, rotating motion.

Begin with coarse paper #180. If the stones have been pre-smoothed you can start with

#220. Rinse, dry, and examine for marks to be removed. This first sanding done well is very important, and saves time and disappointment later on.

Repeat with #320 paper. Stones should look almost finished after this sanding. At any step where flaws in the finishing show, go back to an earlier sanding step and do over. Repeat the rinsing, drying and checking each time before going to the next size paper.
Repeat with #400 paper. This step should remove scratches left from the coarser papers, and any white spots. Rinse, dry and check.

Complete the sanding with #600 paper. Rinse, dry, and check. Examine carefully for any scratches. If there are any, go back to the #320 paper and repeat each succeeding step. When youhave finished again with the #600 and are satisfied with the appearance of the stone,

you are ready for the polishing.

To polish, sprinkle a very small amount of polishing powder on the slightly dampened velvet. A very short rotating rub does the polishing. Continued rubbing is not necessary. If any scratches show at this point, go back to the #400 paper and work thru #600 and polish once more. Do this until your stone looks the way you want it.

Doing each step carefully should give you a finely polished stone to be proud of.
