FALL COLOR TOUR....Bruce Spike

It's that time of year again. Natures preview which we have been seeing over the past two or three weeks makes you wonder if the colors will be extra early. At this point in time to quote Ernie Johnson, we can only guess.

Look for a date about Sept. 27 or Oct. 4. Since we will be heasing west into Baraga County. colors could peak a little early.

Regardless of an exact date, here is our schedule: Meet at the Courthouse, Baraga Ave., Marquette at 8:30 a.m. then we can get everyone on the road by 9:00. Those who live further west can join the convoy at Snyder Drug west of Ishpeming. Late comers may get left behind (it's better to plan on being early and not hold up those who come on time.) First stop will be at Van Riper State Park (pit stop) on the north side of US 41 just east of the Peshekee River. There are some beautiful hills just about a mile north at Martin's

Landing, a swing through there will warrant a few shutter snaps.

Then back to U S 41 and head west, if you don't know which way is west, hang a right onto U S 41. Next stop; Sturgeon River Park about a mile south of Alberta. A short hike down stream to see Canyon Falls and Upper Falls. It is about 3/4 mile down to the Upper Falls, if you take your time you can still make it in about an hour.

Next, hang a left onto U S 41 and head for L'Anse. We might stop in to the Bishop Baraga Shrine rather than try for the Arvon Slate Quarry. With all the rain we have had the road near the quarry may be impassable. It was in bad shape the last time I was there.

Regardless of road condtions, on the Arvon road, we will continue on Skanee road to McCombe Corner, then Erick Road to Big Eric's Bridge and the Water falls on the Big Huron River. Good pit stop at the little park here.

From here its southeast on the Big Bay Road through the woods to the Triple A road and the Yellow Dog Plains. We can check to see if the old log building at Anderson's Homestaad is still standing. The Yelloe Dog Plains are forested with Jack Pine but there are numerous clearcuts and new plangtings to give you a view of the hardwood hills to the south.

If anyone has enought energy left they can visit Pinnacle Falls on the Yellow Dog River. Its downhill in but a steep climb back up.

Eventually we will come to County Road 510. Here you have a choice of routes to go home. To the left you will join Co. Rd. 550 Which leads to Marquette. To the right, Co. Rd. 510 leads to Midway Drive and U.S.41; road conditions may be rough but the scenery is great. Have a nice day and pray for good weather.

( A suggestion: Because it's a case of one date or the other and you don't want to sit outside the courthouse on the first date in vain, call Bruce Spike and let him know that you would like to go and would like a call before the exact date. There will be no other way to contact you.)

STATE\_ STONE --- "PETOSKEY STONE"

Who said rocks do not talk? For example, a Petoskey Stone, through legend and facts, can tell you much about Michigan history and geology.

Legend and history are often intertwined. Such is the case with the Petoskey Stone. The nam-Petoskey Stone likely came about because it was found and sold as souvenirs of the Petoskey area. The name Petoskey appears to have originated late in the 18th century. Its roots stem from an Ottowa Indian legend.

Addording to legend, a descendant of French nobility named Antoine Carre visited what is now the Petoskey area and became a fur trader with the John Jacob Astor Fur Company. In time he me and married, an Ottawa Indian princess. Carre became known to the Indians as Nea-a-tooshing. Eventually he was adopted by the tribe and made chief.

In the spring of 1787, after having spent the winter near what is now Chicago, Chief Nea-atooshing and his royal family started home. Enroute, the party camped on the banks of the Kala marco River. During the night, a son was born to the Chief. As the sun rose, its rays fell on the face of the new baby. Noting the glorious sunshine on his son's face, the Chief proclaimed, "His name shall be Pe-tos-e-gay (or Be-dos-e-gay, there are several versions). He shall become an important person." The translation of the name is "rising sun", "rays of dawn" or Ysunbeams of promise."

True to his father's prediction, Pe-tos-e-gay became an important person. He was a fur trader and merchant who acquired much land and wealth. His appearance was outstanding. His skin was smooth, his eyes sharp and deeply set, and he spoke English quite well. Ultimately he married the young daughter of Chief Pok-o-zee-gun, and Ottawa Chief from the northern southern peninsula of Michigan. They had two daughters and eight sons.

In the summer of 1873, just a few years before the death of Pe-tos-e-gay, a city came into being on his land along the bay at Bear Greek. The site was a field overgrown with June grass. Only a few nondescript buildings existed. The population was not more than 50 or 60. It was named Petoskey, an English adaptation of Fe-tos-e-gay. Thus they honored someone who gave his land, named and the heritage of "sunbeams of promise."

Today Petoskey is a growing city with all the comforts of modern life and an appreciation of modern life and an appreciation of the past. This is where Petoskey Stones are found. For those who look, Petoskey stones are along the beaches, inland in gravel deposits and in gift shops.

The most often asked question is, "What is a Petoskey Stone?" Petoskeys are a fossil colonial coral. These corals lived in warm shallow seas that covered Michigan during Devonian times some 350 million years ago.

Almost a century after the founding of Petoskey, on June 28, 1965, Governor George Romney, signed a bill that made the Petoskey Stone Michigan's Official State Stone. It was fitting that Miss Ell Jane Petoskey, the only living grandchild of Chief Pe-tos-e-gay, was present at the formal signing.

The legislation is gery general. The bill simply states the Petoskey Stone is the State Stone. The designation of Haxagonaria percarinata was made by Dr. Edwin C. Stumm in 1969. Dr. Stumm made this distinction based on his extensive knowledge of fossils.

This specific fossil coral is found only in the rock strata known as the Gravel Point Formation. The Gravel Point Formation is part of the Traverse Group of Devonian age. The Gravel Point Formation is a mixture of limestones and shales. The outcrops of these rocks are restricted to the Little Traverse Bay area near Petoskey.

stricted to the Little Traverse Bay area near Petoskey. The Gravel Point Formation is only part of the Devonian geologic history found in Michigan. Devonian age rocks form the bedrock for much of the norther Southern Peninsula. Devonian rocks outerop at less than 3 percent of the surface of the United States. Michigan's average is much higher. Much of what is known is interpreted from the fossil record.

At least seven different species of the genus Hexagonaria are found in Devonian rocks in Michigan. The Petoskey Stone family of corals are found in Iowa, Indiana, Illinois, Ohio, New York, Canada, Germany, England, and even Asia. These escals are difficult to distinguish from each other on casual inspection. In order to tell these corals apart you must become familiar with coral anatomy and the related terms.
