# MYSTERY MINERAL OF-THE MONTH

mystery mineral is to research the **before** the meeting so that you will is pulled from the hat.

January - The mineral enigma for January is one that most Club members probably have in their collections. It is a common mineral in the U.P., and particularly in the volcanics of the Keweenaw peninsula. It is a complex calcium, aluminum, iron silicate (Ca<sub>2</sub>Al<sub>2</sub>FeOSiO<sub>4</sub>SiO<sub>7</sub>(OH)) that forms crystals in the monoclinic system. The crystals are short to long prismatic, often deeply striated; also thick tabular to acicular. It is also commonly massive, coarse to fine granular, and even fibrous. The hardness is 6-7 with a specific gravity about 3.3. It has perfect cleavage in one direction. The most distinguishing characteristic of this mineral is the color. It is usually a yellowish green to pistachio green and may be transparent to opaque. It has a vitreous luster and the streak is uncolored to grayish. It occurs chiefly in regionally metamorphosed igneous and sedimentary rocks but also as an alteration of plagioclase feldspars and in contact zones. Superb examples of this mineral can be found in many world wide locations. Crystals from Prince of Wales Island, Alaska, and Untersulzbachtal, Salzburg, Austria immediately come to mind. No excuses excepted for missing this one!

February - February's mystery mineral is a mineral that forms in a series. It is part of the Plagioclase (feldspar) group. The series ranges from Albite {Ab}, (NaAlSi<sub>3</sub>O<sub>8</sub>) to Anorthite {An}, (CaAl<sub>2</sub>Si<sub>2</sub>O<sub>8</sub>). The minerals in this group are characterized by the percentage of Anorthite {An} end member they contain. Thus, albite is described as 'An 0-10', which means it only has 0-10% of the calcium-rich end member, anorthite and has 90-100% of the sodium-rich end member, Albite. Our mystery mineral is described as 'An 50-70', which means it has 50-70% of the calcium-rich end member anorthite and less than 50% of the sodium-rich albite. If you understand all this, you are well on your way to becoming a true "mineralogist". This mineral forms triclinic crystals and has a hardness of 6-6.5. The specific gravity is around 2.7 and it has perfect cleavage in one direction and nearly perfect cleavage in two other directions. The crystals are tabular, but not common. This mineral is usually massive, cleavable, granular or compact. Twinning is common. The mineral may be colorless, yellow, white, or gray and frequently shows plays of bright colors such as blue, green, red, yellow, and pearl gray. It is transparent to translucent with a vitreous luster and has a white streak. This mineral occurs widespread as a constituent of basalts, gabbros, and other igneous rocks. It is most famous as fine large masses, showing a vivid display of colors, from the northeastern area of Canada (from which its name is derived). This mineral is also found in some of the basalts in the Keweenaw series in Houghton and Keweenaw counties. Good luck!

March - The name for our March mystery mineral is now a name that describes two minerals (marialite & meionote). These two minerals also form a chemical series that varies between marialite (3 NaAlSi<sub>3</sub>O<sub>8</sub> · NaCl) to meionite (3 CaAl<sub>2</sub>Si<sub>2</sub>O<sub>8</sub> · CaCO<sub>3</sub>). The group name applies to both these minerals and all the chemical variations that occur between both end-members. This mineral crystallizes in the tetragonal system, has a hardness of 5-6.5, and a specific gravity of 2.5-2.8. Wernite is a name commonly used to describe intermediate members of this group. Crystals are usually prismatic and coarse and may be quite large. The mineral is brittle, has a vitreous luster, and its color may be white, gray, yellow, or even bluish, greenish, or reddish (the color is usually light). The mineral is transparent to translucent and the streak is uncolored. It is common in metamorphic rocks, as crystalline schists, gneisses, and amphibolites. It is most abundant as a contact metamorphic mineral in crystalline limestones near the contact with granite or allied rocks. It is often associated with light colored pyroxene, amphibole, garnet, and also with apatite, titanite, and zircon. Several locations in Ontario, Canada produce excellent specimens. In Michigan, it is reputed to occur at the Metronite & Rinn's Quarries near Felch in Dickinson County.

April - Our mystery mineral for April is a relatively common specie that has a very simple chemistry. It is a zinc carbonate (ZnCO<sub>3</sub>). Crystals are in the hexagonal system and usually rhombohedrons with curved faces common. Most collectors are more familiar with this mineral in botryoidal, stalagtitic, or reniform specimens. The hardness is 4 - 4½ and it has nearly perfect rhombohedral cleavage. The specific gravity is 4.3 - 4.45. The color may be white, grayish, pale to deep yellow, yellowish brown to brown, pale green to bright apple green, bluish green, blue and even pale to deep pink! It is transparent to translucent with a vitreous to pearly luster and a white streak. It is probably best known for spectacular botryoidal specimens of bright blue to blue-green color from the Kelly mine near Magdalena, New Mexico. High quality stones may be used for lapidary purposes. It has not been reported from Michigan. This one is a "piece of cake"!

# A Helping Hand for Youth via Identified Rocks & Minerals

First, lets review what we presently have in the Rocks and Minerals egg cartons we offer children/beginners at our Swap and Show. Every item is numbered and named, a permanent reference; ready to be the beginning of a small notebook listing the minerals (one to a page) with ample room to write down information, description, use, etc., as the new collector learns from books, friends, and now, computers.

Egg carton #1 has the following minerals: Copper, Pyrite, Specular Hematite, Magnetite, Limonite, Goethite, Calcite, Gypsum (Satin Spar), Quartz-Agate, Quartz-Crystalline, Muscovite & Feldspar, and Garnet in Schist.

Egg carton #2 has examples of: 4 Igneous rocks: Pumice, Obsidian, Basalt, and Granite; 4 Sedimentary rocks: Sandstone, Clay Concretion, Limestone, and Fossil; and 4 Metamorphic rocks: Slate, Quartzite, Jaspilite, and Kona Dolomite. This fits in with a "geology" unit in grade school.

"Proposed" Egg carton #3 - we have talked about minerals for this one and have 50 specimens of each of the following: Galena, Fluorite, Epidote, Flint, and Chert. We <u>STILL NEED</u> 50 of: <u>ANKERITE</u>, <u>CHALCOCITE</u>, <u>PETRIFIED WOOD</u>, <u>BORNITE</u>, <u>GRAPHITE</u>, <u>SHALE</u>, and 25 small GEODES - sawed in half.

Other possibilities: Azurite, Malachite, Siderite, Sodalite, Linarite, Chrysocolla, etc. - as long as you have 50 small pieces of a kind. At this point we can use them in place of those printed in Capitols. Any minerals over the 12 kinds needed to fill egg carton #3 will be held for carton #4.

Lets all get behind this project and help our youth become acquainted with and interested in our mineral resources. This request goes to all our Club members, near and far. We need Fifty of a kind, about the size of a walnut or a small egg. If you don't have any of what is needed, ask friends in other clubs you belong to. Remember, they can be 50 of a kind not mentioned above. Please include where each mineral is found.

Write to me when you have 50 of a kind. I would like to know by early May. Each mineral will be assigned a number and this number must be put on each specimen. The twelve names, with their corresponding numbers, need to be put on a strip of paper and the strip then glued in each of the egg cartons. You may need to send me the minerals or I can let you know the numbers assigned to that mineral and you can put it on each specimen and bring them to me a few days before the Show and Swap.

Future young rockhounds thank you for being interested in them and for providing a permanent visual collection of rocks and minerals.

### CALIFORNIA DREAMIN

"No other single event in the history of California has had such a profound impact on the economic development of the state as the discovery of gold at Coloma in the winter of 1848. Most of the gold found in the early part of the "gold rush" was in the form of dust or nuggets separated from the debris of the rivers and streams west of Sacramento.

Later, when the gold became harder to find using primitive gold pans, rockers and sluices, large companies were formed to mine the gold in situ. From these lode mines, as they are called, gold is found in the rock (usually quartz) where it formed millions of years ago. Most of the gold from the lode mines is irregular masses ranging from microscopic size to pieces weighing tens of pounds.

If the conditions at the time the gold is formed are exactly right, the gold will form crystals. Crystals of gold are extremely rare and only one mine out of a thousand will produce crystallized gold.

Crystallized gold has several forms ranging from flat plates, called leaves, to distinct crystals with sharp lustrous faces, in the forms of octahedrons, cubes and variations of each. These types of gold specimens are of interest to museums and collectors due to their extreme rarity. The value of a crystallized gold specimen is not tied to the intrinsic value of gold it contains."
